FUNERAL MUSIC SUGGESTIONS

St. Patrick Catholic Church, Mount Dora, Florida

Music is integral to all Christian worship, including our funeral rites. It allows the community to express feelings that words alone may fail to convey. It has the power to console and uplift the mourners and to strengthen the unity of the assembly in faith and love. The texts of songs chosen for a particular celebration should express the Paschal mystery of the Lord's suffering, death, and triumph over death and should be related to the readings from Scripture.

Since music can evoke strong feelings, the music for the celebration of the funeral liturgy should be chosen with great care. The music at funerals should support, console, and uplift the participants and should help to create in them a spirit of hope in Christ's victory over death and in the Christian's share in that victory.

Responsorial Psalm

The psalms are rich in imagery, feeling, and symbolism. They powerfully express the suffering, pain, hope, and trust of people of every age and culture. Above all, the psalms sing of faith in God, of revelation, and of redemption. They enable the assembly to pray in the words that Jesus himself used during his life on earth. In the psalms, the members of the assembly pray in the voice of Christ, who intercedes on their behalf before the Father (OCF, 25). Since the psalms are songs, whenever possible, they should be sung (OCF, 26). Psalm texts should come from the Book of Psalms, and the Responsorial Psalm should never be replaced by another hymn or song, even if that text is scriptural. Psalms are also very appropriate for use during the communion procession.
